Incident Update from the Missoula City-County Health Department

Current closure orders:

- Restaurants and bars countywide must remain closed until 8 a.m. Tuesday, March 24 (with exception of take-out, drive-thru and delivery). The order may be extended or modified at that time.
- Gyms and theaters countywide must remain closed until 11:59 p.m. Tuesday, March 24. The order may be extended or modified at that time.
- Public K-12 schools statewide must remain closed through Friday, March 27.

Travel guidance:

- Guidance for residents returning from spring break or other travel:
 - People who have traveled to an area identified as Level 3 for sustained and widespread COVID-19 they need to call the health department at 406-258-3896. This currently includes most of Europe, including UK and Ireland, Iran, China, South Korea and Malaysia. Visit <u>www.cdc.gov/travel/notices</u> for the most up-to-date travel advisories.
 - All other travelers do not need to report to the health department at this time; however, they need to watch for COVID-19 symptoms of fever, coughing and difficulty breathing, and they should also practice social distancing. People DO NOT need to get tested unless they develop symptoms. People should not go to the ER, a clinic or the health department asking for a "screening test" if they are asymptomatic.
 - If people do develop symptoms, they should use the screening tools and focused screening center resources listed at <u>missoula.co/cvirus</u>. They should not go to the ER or health department.
- Travel recommendations and guidance will continue to change, and health department's recommendations and guidance may change. Please stay tuned and stay healthy.

Guidance for employees returning to work:

• If someone tests positive for COVID-19, a public health nurse will let them know when they can return to work. If someone has symptoms but doesn't test positive, they can return when symptoms resolve. The health department encourages people to

remember that this incident is constantly evolving and that guidance may change as more information becomes available.

University of Montana	 Remote course delivery will continue through the rest of spring semester. UM will not return to face-to-face instruction this semester. Based on new guidance from the Montana University System, we strongly recommend that students do not return to the residence halls after spring break if they have another housing option. We know some students do not have another housing option, and we will continue to work with local health care officials to ensure the best accommodations possible in our residence halls. For students who live off campus, we encourage them to continue their studies in a location where social distancing is most feasible. For some, that may be here in Missoula. For others, that may be back in their hometown.
Missoula County Public Schools	 Please visit mcpsmt.org/covid-19 for updates. All MCPS buildings are closed until Friday, March 27, including the Business Building, Administration Building, all school sites PK-12, and the Lifelong Learning Center. MCPS and schools will be canceling or rescheduling any school-related event that exceeds gatherings of people over 10, including the March 25 Strategic Planning Meeting, high school proms, and any concerts and special events planned at schools between now and May 8, 2020. All MHSA spring activities will be indefinitely suspended until further notice. This includes practices and contests/meets/festivals. The Executive Board will reevaluate this situation on April 13, and any additional information regarding spring activities will be provided as it becomes available. Our schools will be open, with limited access, on Monday, March 23, to allow staff and students to pick up essential items from the buildings. Parents and students can pick up personal items, medication and instruments Families that requested a loaner laptop can pick them up on Monday.

Woodman and Sunset School Districts: On Monday, March 23, we will open our buildings to families from 9 a.m. to noon so families can collect their child's belongings. All students in grades 5-8 will be issued their personal school Chromebook. Families with children in grades K-4 will be issued, at minimum, one device per family per your request regardless of your personal internet access. If you do not currently have internet access but internet access is available in your area, please contact Mariah for suggestions to get your home connected. March 23-27: teachers will compile strategies and educational activities that families can use to keep students engaged in learning during the school closure. Our goal is to provide a structure for at-home learning so families can have some easy to implement activities to keep our students engaged and prevent learning loss in skills and knowledge during an extended break. If schools remain closed after Monday, March 30, due to a directive by Gov. Steve Bullock or a decision by the Board of Trustees, teachers will work diligently to deliver instructional materials related to your child's individualized needs.

Missoula International Airport	 Terminal cleaning is focused on cleaning items with high touch factors (doorknobs, keypads, toilet handles, counters, luggage carts, etc.) at least three times per day. In addition, the terminal is being disinfected from top to bottom on a daily basis using a fogging system that kills 100% of bacteria and viruses on contact. Signs notifying passengers who have traveled to Level 3 countries and regions have been posted throughout the terminal. Closely monitoring reported cases for any connection to the airport. Closely monitoring national actions and determining how those actions affect local operations. Creating two teams that will have limited physical contact to allow for continued operations in the event of a diagnosis in any given team member. Traffic counts continue to decline.
